Alumni Profile

Diligence. It is a word that some say is heard less, and a concept that is ignored more and more. But to members of Sigma Phi Epsilon, it is one of the three Cardinal Principles. To 1971 Sigma Phi Epsilon alumnus, Dr. Michael Egan, the meaning and importance of the word have not faded.

Throughout Egan's college and alumni life, he has given his full effort to Sig Ep. As a member of the 1968 pledge

class, "The Dirty Dozen," Egan recalls some of the duties the chapter required of him.

"Mostly, we had to learn a great deal about the pledges and brothers. We had to know just about every aspect of their personal lives," Egan says. "We also had to learn everything about the history of the local and national

"Sig Ep is really special to me. As far as my personal development at college is concerned, Sig Ep was the most

important factor. And it was even more important at a large university like UConn," Egan says.

Since Egan's graduation from UConn in 1971, his personal life has been very busy. He graduated from the Georgetown University Dental School in 1975 with his D.D.S., and established a private practice in Hartford in 1976.

"The practice is doing very well," Egan says. "I'm in an expansion phase right now and the practice is growing." Egan also got married ten years ago, and lives with his wife, Vicki, in Portland, Conn. Right now their house is occupied by a "family" that is composed of a yellow labrador and a golden retriever, as well as several cats.

"I don't know what kind of cats they are," he says with a chuckle.

Despite Egan's commitment to his family and his practice, he has kept his diligence toward the fraternity intact by remaining very active on the Alumni Board and by attending undergraduate sponsored alumni events.

"When the chapter was rechartered in 1981, Jerry Dallas got in touch with me, and the five of us were about the bare minimum that made up the Alumni Board at that time," he says. "I was a part of the group that literally built the house on Gilbert Road."

Work that needed to be done on the house included the addition of the third floor, so nine more brothers could live in the house; the addition of a sprinkler system and the fire escape, to bring the house up to fire-safety standards; and many of the finishing touches.

Egan also served as president of the Alumni Board for four years, until other commitments forced him to give up the position. "But my dentist office is still the home of most of the Alumni Board meetings," he says.

And Egan still finds time to have fun with the undergraduate chapter as well. "I still attend Yale games with friends from my undergraduate days. I'm trying to get in touch with other Alums who want to go to the banquet this semester."

As a result of Egan's hard work, dedication and diligence to Sigma Phi Epsilon, members of the Alumni board established the "Egan/Ogren" Award. This award honors the undergraduate brother who proves to be the best big brother during each pledge period.

They honored the work and dedication that Roger and I put into the house, and that honor comes about only

through exemplifying that type of commitment and dedication," Egan says.

Egan is happy with the strong growth and reputation Connecticut Alpha has developed during the past six years. But he has some advice for the chapter and Alumni to follow to assure continued strength for the years to come.

''The chapter needs to maintain contact with its recent alumni. They shouldn't have to make the same mistakes twice." he says, adding that the chapter can learn from its past mistakes.

As the University makes plans for its "dream campus," which tentatively plans for the demolition of the houses on Gilbert Road, Egan hopes alumni will be looking out for the future of Connecticut Alpha, and for the entire Greek community at UConn.

"I would like to see the creation of independent housing for each member of the Greek community," he says. "I also encourage alumni to take an active role in the next step of Sig Ep development—establishment of permanent housing."

For Dr. Mike Egan, Diligence has played an important role in his life, whether he is easing the pain of one of his dental patients or attending an Alumni Board meeting. But with a person so grounded in one of our Cardinal Principles, Virtue and Brotherly Love can't help but shine through as well.

Hartford Regionals Prove Spectacular

The 1987 Sigma Phi Epsilon Regional Leadership Academy was held in Hartford, Connecticut, with Connecticut Alpha being the host chapter. Held in the Parkview Hilton from February 21-23, this year's academy proved to be one of the best ever. With a stupendous showing by Connecticut Alpha — 64 undergraduates in attendance - everything ran smoothly. The chapter hung up a welcoming banner, provided a guide to local nightspots and served as liaisons between the headquarters staff and the other undergraduates. Individual contributions to the academy's program were made by Brother Ed Kaplan who served as the Standard's Chairman, Brothers Todd Blewett and Paul Saloom who led discussions on the ritual, Chaplain Luis Baez who delivered the banquet convocation, and Chapter President Brian Kurnik who delivered the opening greeting.

The Leadership Academy is a yearly event in which younger brothers and new officers get a chance to gain knowledge on specific chapter operations and the fraternity in general. It is also a chance for local alumni to offer their own experiences regarding leadership skills and how it can be applied in the fraternity setting. Sigma Phi Epsilon's Headquarters also invited a number of experts to field questions on issues confronting fraternities in the '80s. Connecticut Alpha was especially honored to have Mrs. Judith Preston, UConn's Coordinator of Greek Life, volunteer her services to the panel. Any alumni interested in possibly volunteering their services for future Leadership Academies should contact Joe Langella, National Alumni Director, at headquarters.

New Relationship between University and Greeks

The new Statement of Relationship between The University of Connecticut and The Greek System provides a better understanding of the position assumed by the Division of Student Affairs towards the developing Greek system on campus. As mentioned by Dr. Carol Wiggins in its introductory letter: "it supports Greek life and provides the necessary guidelines for a positive working relationship between The University of Connecticut and the Greek organizations."

The Statement of Relationship seeks the mutual support from the Greek and academic system for the enrichment of the individual both in professional and social life. The University of Connecticut recognizes the value of the Greek system as to "provide a living-learning experience in a democracy" and by their enhancement "through the work of loyal alumni and strong undergraduate chapters."

Included in the statement there is a description of what is called the stages of recognition: Full Recognition, Provisional and Probational Recognition. In the Full and Provisional Recognition, the University supports and conditions the establishment of Greek chapters on campus, while the Probational Recognition applies certain sanctions against a chapter that has failed to maintain the University regulations.

Other topics mentioned by the Statement of Relationship reaffirm the policies described in The University of Connecticut Handbook and by the Division of Residential Life with respect to academic and living standards in the University community.

Spring Point System Working Well

For the Spring 1987 semester, in addition to the fine system, a point system was being used by the chapter in which a brother must have 85% of the mandatory points to attend the banquet. All mandatory events were given a point value.

Any brother who was unexcused from an event was fined as well as lost the points in question. The brother then had two weeks to make up lost points by doing various extra deeds.

So far the system has worked well and attendance at mandatory functions has improved. The chapter secretary was in charge of keeping track of the points as well as informing any brother who was below the 85% minimum needed. The continued use of the system will be voted on at the end of the semester.
