Housing Negotiations in Progress

As Sigma Phi Epsilon has grown in recent years on the UConn campus, the need for a larger house has grown stronger and stronger. Our present house - located at 9 Gilbert Road - has served us adequately since 1981. Back then, we were a 30-man organization in its infancy. We have grown since then, however, to a 100-plus-man chapter, and consequently have realized the need for a larger home - one with the capacity to house a greater percentage of brothers.

Cause for encouragement has come for such a house. For the past few months, the University has been negotiating with Sig Ep and other fraternities on the entire housing issue. Sites have been selected, and recommendations have been made. Now, more than ever before, large hurdles are being crossed. This is due, in large part, to the receptive attitudes and collaberative efforts of the fraternity and the university.

Special thanks are in order to Jerry Dallas, Alumni Board President Mark Brodgenski, and many others for their dedicated efforts. With their help, securing a new fraternity house we can be proud of will no longer be a pipe dream. It will be a reality - the Greek Rock of Gibralter on the UConn campus which will stand as a Mecca for undergrads and alumni alike.







Brothers pause after a long day of tobogganing.


The 3rd annual Alumni Winter Weekend was held this past January during winter recess. The attendance was the best yet, and a good time was had by all.

Renaissance of Brotherhood

The Renaissance of Brotherhood program enables the chapter to explain the concept of the "Fraternity" and the principles of Sigma Phi Epsilon to a member of the "public." This serves not only to increase our awareness and understanding of our Ritual, but also the awareness and understanding of fraternities by the general public. A candidate is selected by the chapter when the chapter believes a candidate has lived his life in accordance with the cardinal principles of Virtue, Diligence, and Brotherly Love.

Virtue, Diligence, and Brotherly Love... if there's one man on the University of Connecticut campus who exemplifies the cardinal principles of Sigma Phi Epsilon, it's Father Mark David Janus, the man who the Connecticut Alpha chapter initiated as a Renaissance Brother this semester.

Originally from Bloomington, Indiana, Father Mark David is a Catholic priest at St. Thomas Aquinas on campus, as well as a graduate student of Psychology. Father Mark David has spent much time working with teenagers, and is the co-author of the book, "Adolescent Runaways."

The brothers at Connecticut Alpha first considered initiating Father Mark David after he volunteered to speak on "Brotherhood" at the chapter's Retreat this past January. The brothers feel there is a positive effect on both the chapter and the community when they initiate a respected member of the community. Father Mark David is both a credit to the undergraduate chapter and Sigma Phi Epsilon in general.

Public Relations Report

Sig Ep has been the leading fraternity at UCONN for several years. We are the largest fraternity with some of the most active students on campus; we rush large groups of prospective members; and we won both homecoming and Greek week during school year 1987-88. These, combined with our being one of Sig Ep's best nation wide, in comparison, put us that much further ahead. As a result, Greeks and non-Greeks see us as elitists and resent our long-lived success.

The goal of the Public Relations committee this semester was to interface Sig Ep with the other Greeks and with the student body at large in an effort to diffuse that animosity.

Spring Semester activities with sororities included: A Dating Game with Kappa Kappa Gamma — Brian Kurnik emceed while Ralph Hedenberg and EJ Hodes won dates and free breakfasts at Gil's; A formal Hearts and Arrows party with Pi Phi was laden with mixed drinks and hors d'oeuvres; Two brunches with Kappa Alpha Theta; Tuck-ins with KAT; A See-saw marathon with Delta Zeta; Our first movie night with DZ; and a Japanese movie night with Delta Gamma — we spread cushions over the floor and had a shoes off movie night. All sororities received invitations to our parties.

To work on relations with other fraternities, we hosted a party at the end of last semester with Alpha Phi Alpha at the Sig Ep house. With the exception of the Beach Party, all fraternities were invited to our parties this semester. This worked well and promoted cooperation, as opposed to competition. Sig Ep participated in Sigma Alpha Epsilon's weight lift-a-thon. We had Zeta Psi and Delta Chi over to play volleyball, and we had a few brothers who participated in Alpha Gamma Rho's Aggie Challenge.

In an effort to make non-Greeks feel more comfortable with Sig Ep, brothers were encouraged to bring friends around to play football and volleyball, to watch movies, and to show them around. We also enlisted their support during Greek Week activities to make them aware of interfraternal cooperation and spirit. As a community project, we scheduled over 300 donors for the Red Cross Blood Drive

Alumni Profile: Roger Ogren

Brother Roger Ogren graduated from the University of Connecticut with a Commercial Art degree in 1970. Today, he is a Senior Graphic Designer at Pratt and Whitney, where he has worked for the past nine years. His work in internal communications involves designing brochures, posters, and slide presentations. The highlight of his career at Pratt and Whitney occurred two years ago when he was responsible for designing and setting up an air show which attracted approximately a quarter of a million people.

While an undergraduate, Brother Roger held the office of Vice President. At that time, Connecticut Alpha had approximately 35 brothers, all of whom lived under the same roof in what is now called "Frats." In addition to fostering many lasting friendships, Roger feels his fraternity experience helped him "to attain leadership skills and to respect other people's opinions." Roger adds, "Votes were taken and everyone stood behind the decisions. Being in a fraternity taught me how to work as a team member."

After college, Roger served as an officer in the Army during the Vietnam war. In contrast to other officers who had attended military schools, Roger feels his collegiate and fraternity experience gave him "a better feel for dealing with the people I was in command of and may have possibly resulted in my successful command of troops under stressful circumstances."

Today many of Roger's closest friends are fraternity brothers. Brother Olsen was the best man at his wedding, and his attorney, James Szeiejko, and Dentist, Mike Egan, are also brothers. Roger said, "I still keep in close touch with four or five brothers, and I speak with a brother at least once a week." Roger has also seen many other brothers at various functions over the past 18 years.

Roger was a founding member of the Connecticut Alumni of Sig Ep Inc. He spent nearly every weekend of an entire summer working on putting on the third floor and fire escape of the current Connecticut Alpha Sig Ep house. Longtime friend and brother, Jerry Dallas, describes Roger as "one of the most solid and loyal men I've ever met. He would give everything he could for a worthwhile cause."

We can all be proud of Brother Ogren's accomplishments and dedication. He truly exemplifies the cardinal principles, Virtue, Diligence, and Brotherly Love. Each semester, an undergraduate big brother receives the Egan/Ogren Outstanding Big Brother Award. Recent winners have been Scott Mitchell, Paul Saloom, Brian Sabia, Sean Walsh, Mike Ryan, and Craig Zettergren. Winners should feel proud to follow such a fine example.
