chapter, 1980 to the present.





# Thank you, Sig Ep

Every once in a while something happens that changes the way you look at certain groups. On Wednesday, March 29th I had such an experience. As Coordinator of the Rape Education Program (REP), I have read lots of literature that cites fraternities as places where sexual assaults happen frequently. My impression has been affected by this literature, and I basically thought of many "frat" brothers as being insensitive and not caring about issues of violence against women.

This perspective was radically altered by the Sigma Phi Epsilon fraternity. The week of March 27 - March 31 was Sexual Assault Awareness Week and without the help of Sigma Phi Epsilon, it couldn't have happened. They

were there Sunday night when REP needed help putting over 3,000 chalk "X's" on campus. On Wednesday, REP showed the film "The Accused" in AS 55. The brothers of Sigma Phi Epsilon worked on publicity, passed out literature, ribbons, collected donations and helped run the film equipment. In addition to all of this, they also presented REP with a check which will help us continue to educate the campus on issues of violence against women.

I would like to thank the brothers of Sigma Phi Epsilon for their assistance. You really helped make Sexual Assault Awareness Week a success.

### Vern Gildhouse Named National Song Chairman


Sigma Phi Epsilon has created a new position at the National Volunteer level, the National Song Chairman. This position will have as its primary responsibility the bi-annual Conclave Choir. As many Connecticut Alpha brothers know, singing in the choir every two years has been a big event for our chapter's large contingent. Brother Vern Gildhouse will serve as the first National Song Chairman.

Vern was initiated in the spring of '87 under the Renaissance of Brotherhood program. A 1979 graduate of Southwestern Oklahoma State University, Vern holds two music degrees, a BS in Music and a Bachelor of Music Education. He is a Captain in the U.S. Army, and served as an assistant professor of Military Science in the ROTC program at UConn. Vern is currently on assignment in Korea.

Vern became interested in Sigma Phi Epsilon through several of the brothers in the ROTC program. After attending three faculty receptions at the chapter house, Vern liked what he saw in Sig Ep and was invited to initiate by the brothers. Unlike most honorary initiates, Vern asked if he could go through the pledge program to better understand the chapter and the brothers.

Vern has been to both Conclaves since his initiation, appearing as soloist in New Orleans and Choir Director in St. Louis. He has had the opportunity to work with the West Point Choir and has directed several choirs at military posts in both Europe and in the United States. He has been a section leader for the Augusta Symphony Choir and has toured as tenor soloist for a ten week concert series in Europe.

Demonstrating outstanding qualities as a brother in Sigma Phi Epsilon, Vern has been honored with the creation of an award in his name at Connecticut Alpha, the Verndell Gildhouse Award for Outstanding Contributions to Sigma Phi Epsilon. # Alumni Accomplishments, Career Changes, etc..


Father Mark David Janus, Renaissance Brither '88, completed his Ph.D. in Clinical Psychology. *Congratulations!*





# Housing and Financial News

### Housing Corporation

Recently, many alumni brothers have shown an interes in Connecticut Alpha's housing needs. While some are interested primarily in future housing possibilities, some have asked to be briefed more thoroughly as to how the chapter's housing needs are presently managed and financed. While this article is in no way complete, we hope it's a first step towards greater understanding. Please direct unanswered questions to the SPEACONN for follow-up.

The Housing Corporation of the Connecticut Alpha Chapter of Sigma Phi Epsilon was established in 1979 under the name Connecticut Alumni of Sigma Phi Epsilon Incorporatred as a nonprofit corporation in the State of Connecticut. The purposes and powers of the corporation include provisions to provide financial assistance to the undergraduate chapter, to hold legal title to the land and buildins occupied by the undergraduate chapter, to budget and control undergraduate receipts and disbursements, and to utilize corporate funds for the leasing, purchasing, or erection of a fraternity house on or near the campus of the University of Connecticut.

The membership of the corporation is wide, encompassing all alumni members of the former chapter at UConn, alumni of the present chapter, any Sig Ep alum living in Connecticut from any chapter, and undergraduate members. The corporation is governed by a yearly elected Board of Directors (the "Alumni Board") as provided for in the by-laws of the Board. Board membership has been self-maintained by the recruitment

and appointment of successor members. New alums as well as older are represented on the Board. Volunteers are continuously sought to serve on the Board. All alums and undergrads are welcome to Board meeting which are held bi-monthly, (every other meeting being held in Storrs during the school year).

Currently, the corporation rents the property located at 9 Gilbert Road, Storrs from the University under the terms of a yearly renewed lease. Because of a change in fire code regulations, the number of dormitory spaces in the house was reduced from twenty to sixteen. It was found that allowing twenty spaces classified the structure under hotel/motel code regulations. Reducing the amount of available spaces to sixteen kept the structure within residential regulations.

Under the terms of the lease, rental is assessed at \$5.61 per square foot. At an approximate 3,192 square feet, rental for the following year, 7/1/90 - 6/30/91, is set at \$1420.00 per month, or \$17,040.00 per year. This is an increase of 47% over the 89/90 school year (\$965.09 monthly, \$11.581.08 total). This increase pales in comparison with increases of previous years. Housing contracts with individual brothers are handled by the Board through its representative, the appointed undergraduate house manager. This year's charge of \$1,014 shows an increase of 45% over last years \$700 per semester. This increase is commensurate with changes in the by-laws that reflect general housing cost increases of University housing. Fraternity housing is competitive with University double occupancy rooming.

Funds taken in beyond rental fees are used for utilities, house maintainance and repair and alumni operations and financing(see below). While a Voluntary Alumni Dues Program has been initiated, publication costs of the SPEACONN have also been handled by Board financing (almost \$1.50 a copy).

### Alumni Chapter Finances by Jon Currey, Controller

Sigma Phi Epsilon's National Housing Corporation maintains a Chapter Investment Fund for each chapter. Loans from this account for long term housing improvements can be granted only by the National Housing Corporation Board of Trustees. The fund is mid-risk high-yield, traditionally earning an average 16% annual return. Currently, Ct. Alpha owns almost 1500 shares valued at \$11,404.46.

The corporation also has assets held in the Nat'l Housing Corp's Equity Management Program. As of the quarter ending 4/90, the corporation had assets of \$79,619.21 (up \$1540.19 for the quarter with 8.15% interest). This low risk fund is also used for long range housing needs.





# Voluntary Alumni Dues


