

50s ERA SIGEPS HOLD REUNION!

On September 23, 2000 25 Connecticut Alpha brothers from the 1950s gathered at the Alumni Center in Storrs for a reunion. Many brothers who attended were actually original members of Iota Nu Delta, the local fraternity that became SigEp in 1957.

For some, it had been 40 years since they last spent time together -- and everyone brought Iota Nu Delta and SigEp memorabilia from their era to share and remember.

The transition to SigEp in the 1950s was completed only after a chapter search committee met with several national fraternities. It was then determined that "The traditions and objectives of Sigma Phi Epsilon ideally matched those of the Iota Nu Delta brothers."

Jerry Doff, Thomas Dorman, John Grzymkowski, and Blair Sibley. We are sure they will be a great asset in the coming years.


